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OUR STORY

Winnipeg's Contemporary Dancers is a not for profit organization & registered charity dedicated to the creation and presentation of contemporary dance.

Founded by Rachel Browne in 1964, the company was incorporated as a registered charity in 1970, and has presented a subscription series since 1971.

In 2021, Winnipeg's Contemporary Dancers celebrates 56 years of creating innovative dance works. WCD has, through the tireless leadership of dedicated contemporary dance artists, fueled the art form's development and established a presence and influence on stages in Winnipeg and across the country.

WCD is a vital resource and presenter for the local and regional community, has had a significant impact on the development of contemporary dance in Canada and is Canada's longest serving contemporary dance company.

Not unlike other companies of its size, WCD moves through phases of development that include expansion and contraction associated with personnel changes, shifts in the cultural landscape and financing, among others.

MESSAGE FROM ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

The 20/21 season was my second season as Artistic Director and WCD's 56th season.

The season was envisioned with optimism and with a desire to embrace the things we could do rather than be defeated by the things we could not.

Key to the season was investing in new creations, providing opportunities for Winnipeg-based artists and adapting our programming to the best of our abilities during the COVID-19 pandemic. WCD worked through long stretches of government restrictions while navigating lockdowns and evolving public health orders. We embraced new ways of doing things, worked through challenges and delivered our programming in new and creative ways.

Clear goals of maintaining commitments to artists, creatively managing ongoing professional training for dancers, and adapting to new ways of working for in-studio rehearsals, new creation and presentation were at the forefront of all artistic decision making.

Despite COVID challenges throughout the entire season, no presentations were dropped and the focus continued to be the three-show subscription series.

SUBSCRIPTION SERIES

WCD's main activity continues to be the subscription series. WCD programmed a broad range of artists: emerging, midcareer, senior, IBPOC, Winnipeg-based and nationaly acclaimed. 20/21 was the first season WCD created & delivered online content.

BEGIN AGAIN

About the work

"I have always felt fortunate to have dance in my life but especially now I am struck by the importance of any new creation. The title Begin Again, is an idea that I think we can all relate to, rebirthing and what that means to us. I am exploring the use of light and props and how they can bring us together, even in a time of socially distancing," – Jera Wolfe, choreographer, explains.

Begin Again + Artist Talk was originally planned to be performed in-person for a sixshow run to physically distanced audiences. Due to government restrictions and public health orders, this show shifted to an online presentation for subscribers/advance

ticket holders, December 15-23, 2020. A second online run - with an enhanced presentation, complete with subtitles and professional editing, ran as a ticketed show, January 22-31, 2021.

BODY & LIGHT

About the work

"Body and light are themes that have come back to me daily during the Covid-19 pandemic. With so many questions encircling me daily, two things became constant. We cannot escape the body and we need light. Whether that light is the light that is inside us, or it is experiencing a sunrise or a sunset, or it is finding light when there is darkness, or it is simply a concept that can assist to move forward," – Jolene Bailie

Body & Light was first planned to be presented at the Rachel Browne Theatre. Due to COVID restrictions, the show was re-envisioned and rescheduled from an indoor theatre performance into a "drivein performance". The pivot required the ensemble work for six dancers to be reimagined and re-choreographed into duets. The re-working was required to ensure gathering limits of no more than 10 people were observed at all times as the show also required crew and staff on site. Body & Light was performed to audiences viewing from their cars on an outdoor stage in a parking lot a short walk from WCD. The show was performed with cars parked on all four sides of the stage and presented for six sold-out performances, June 25-27, 2021.

The indoor theatre rendition, with the full ensemble of choreography and professional lighting design presented, was filmed and presented online, June 03-20, 2021. An Artist Talk with 7 artists and a moderator was released online in July, 2021.



YES/ THIS IS MY MATH DANCE

WCD's third show pivoted to online, June 24-July O4 and saw a reassertion of a commitment to national representation with the presentation of Calgary-based Linea Swan's YES and Toronto-based Sara Porter's This is my Math Dance.

About the works

A manifesto for the post-cynical, YES came to WCD with a history of acclaimed success across the country. Known for her fearless approach to controversial issues, Calgary-based performer/creator, Linnea Swan rigorously integrated dance, theatre and bouffon to address Yvonne Rainer's 1965 "No Manifesto."

WCD introduced the work of Toronto-based Sara Porter to Winnipeg audiences. Navigating identity, queerness and the tender flesh of one's physical self, critically acclaimed Porter is known for her intelligent, humorous and charismatically sharp work.



While the subscription series continues to be the focus of each season, WCD also programmed additional activities.

These additional activities provide significant opportunities for local artists throughout the season. Additional opportunities included on-going training for professional dancers, new creation, remounts, performances, artist talks, projects for emerging dancers and work with guest artists.

Emerging Artist Initiative

September 28 - November 29, 2020:

WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative which was a seven-week project culminating with the online performance, *Up Close and disDANCING*, November 13-29. Dancers included: Justine Erickson, Julious Gamabalan, Andres Felipe Jimenez Mejia, Sophie Milord, Shayla Rudd. *Up Close and disDANCING* featured one new creation by Bailie, *Space or Place*, plus two existing dances re-worked for emerging dancers and adapted for physical distancing. WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative casting was in partnership with The School of Contemporary Dancers.

Professional Classes

September 2020 though May 2021

72 in-person professional level classes delivered. Accompanists included Ian Mikita and Jay Stoller. Teachers included: Jolene Bailie and Jera Wolfe.

February 2021 through end of season: Virtual classes created and made available free online and on demand for dancers to train at home during COVID-19. Classes created by Bailie, with accompanist Ian Mikita. Dancers performing in class included WCD dancers Carol-Ann Bohrn and Mark Dela Cruz + emerging dancer Shayla Rudd.

Anthem

July 1st, 2020.

An outdoor video project in collaboration with several other arts organizations across Canada during COVID-19. Viewed over 28,000 times, the video featured new choreography by Jolene Bailie and performances by WCD artists Carol-Ann Bohrn, Shawn Maclaine, Warren McClelland and Jolene Bailie.

Guest Artist in Residence


May 10-14, 2021

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OUR REACH

Commitment to presenting a broad range of creative work, diversity and improvements to support artists and arts workers:

The 20/21 season included a broad range of voices, national artists, and a commitment to diversity.

WCD is committed to presenting a broad range of creative work and to being a place where the creative work of Indigenous, Black, People of Color, and other marginalized groups, is presented, encouraged and shared. This commitment was added to WCD's mandate in 2020.

For 20/21: WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative featured five dancers, three of which identified as IBPOC; IBPOC artist, Jera Wolfe, was engaged to teach company classes; a new creation, also by IBPOC creator Wolfe, was commissioned to create a new work for WCD, making up 33% of WCD's subscription series; IBPOC dancers were featured prominently in two out of three Subscription Series shows. Casting in three of four ticketed shows featured 25-60% IBPOC dancers. LGBTQ2+ dancers were featured in all subscription shows as well as present on WCD's staff and board. For guest artist in residence, WCD engaged one IBPOC/LGBTQ2+ choreographer & one IBPOC dancer.

WCD completed professional workshops for staff/artists/board/ contract workers which included:

- Awareness: Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, with Thiané Diop of Diversity Essentials
- Unpacking Systemic Oppression, Allyship and Privilege, with Kathy Milla of Diversity Essentials
- WCD organized Safer Spaces Training with facilitators Erica Mcnabb and Aine Dolin of Red Tent.



OUR REACH

Commitment to presenting a broad range of creative work, diversity and improvements to support artists and arts workers:

WCD continues with its' commitment to feature and advance women in dance. The appointment of Bailie as Artistic Director marked the first time a woman held the AD position since founder, Rachel Browne. For the 20/21 season, three out of four choreographers for WCD's subscription series were female identifying.

FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS

WCD envisioned, created and set in motion a plan for adding a genderneutral accessible washroom to its facility. With building permits submitted in April 2021, a plan was set in motion to begin the renovation in the 21/22 season. This renovation includes the addition of a gender-neutral accessible washroom, as well as increased privacy options for the dressing rooms and creating a stand-alone mop closet. 


