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OUR STORY

Winnipeg's Contemporary Dancers (WCD) is a not-for-profit organization & registered charity dedicated to the creation and presentation of contemporary dance.

Founded by Rachel Browne in 1964, the company was incorporated as a registered charity in 1970, and has presented a subscription series since 1971.

In 2021, WCD celebrated 57 years of creating innovative dance works. WCD has, through the tireless leadership of dedicated contemporary dance artists, fueled the art form's development and established a presence and influence on stages in Winnipeg and across the country.

WCD is a vital resource and presenter for the local and regional community, has had a significant impact on the development of contemporary dance in Canada and is Canada's longest-serving contemporary dance company.

Like other companies of its size, WCD moves through phases of development that include expansion and contraction associated with personnel changes, shifts in the cultural landscape and financing, among others.

MESSAGE FROM ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

The 2021/2022 season was my third season as Artistic Director and WCD's $57^{\rm th}$ season.

Key to the season were the return to in-person events, investing in new creations, providing opportunities for Winnipeg-based artists and adapting our programming to the best of our abilities during the COVID-19 pandemic. WCD was thrilled to welcome audiences back to the Rachel Browne Theatre and deliver ambitious programming, despite the challenges of the pandemic.

Despite COVID-19 and uncertainty surrounding a "return to normal," WCD delivered a strong return to in-person performances. WCD delivered almost all its programming as well as launched new and exciting programming throughout the season.

Highlights of the season were numerous: a return to touring; performing Jera Wolfe's *Begin Again* at our Season Launch; an increased number of performances; a return to physical contact and partnering within choreography; performing without masks; welcoming community dancers back for in-person professional level classes; and our spring show, *in between here and now*, which featured an all-Winnipeg team and our highest box office to date during my tenure.

On an operational level, WCD was thrilled to launch a new website, invest in ongoing maintenance at the Rachel Browne Theatre, participate in Safer Spaces training with Red Tent and have all staff complete basic First Aid and CPR training.

2021/2022 also saw an important renovation – adding an accessible and gender-neutral washroom to our condo unit and a well-thought-out renovation of our changerooms – allowing for increased privacy options.

THE SEASON

For the 2021/2022 season, COVID-19 continued to present challenges. Despite this, WCD was optimistic with programming and strategized to have a variety of programming in place so that in the case that programming was impacted due to lockdowns, health and safety reasons, or any other reasons, WCD would have additional options at the ready.

This strategy served the organization extremely well. WCD returned to in-person events, caught up on some smaller postponed projects, saw an increase in revenue from ticket sales/events, had fabulous audience attendance, and was able to add new programming and public events-including many options for free, by donation, and Pay What You May admissions.

WCD connected with international and national award-winning artists to program the season with a broad range of artists: emerging, mid-career, senior, IBPOC, Winnipeg-based and nationally acclaimed artists.


Since 2019, WCD has strived to ensure each Subscription Series includes four main components: work created by the AD, the development of new work featuring local dancers, investing in new creation/commissions, and bringing the work of guest artists to WCD. We are thrilled that we were able to meet all of these goals for 2021/2022.

WCD engaged artists for rehearsals and/or performances in all 12 months of the 2021/2022 season and provided professional-level training during 11 months of the season.



IN-PERSON PERFORMANCES

WCD exists to create and present contemporary dance. For 2021/2022, WCD performed 18 live performances in a variety of settings:




BODY & LIGHT

Body and Light Drive-In Performance, created during and for physically distanced times, featured masked dancers performing outdoors while maintaining physical distancing throughout.

A remarkably creative endeavor during COVID-19, dancers performed on a raised stage outdoors in a parking lot. Cars parked on all four sides the stage and the live audience viewed from inside their parked cars. This was truly a unique event in Winnipeg's downtown, with audience members tuning in through their car radios for sound.

Body & Light was presented in partnership with Théâtre Cercle Molière and Manitoba Centennial Corporation. Special thanks to Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre and Impark for additional assistance. Body and light are themes that have come back to me daily during the COVID-19 pandemic. With so many questions encircling me daily, two things became constant. We cannot escape the body and we need light. Whether that light is the light that is inside us, or it is experiencing a sunrise or a sunset, or it is finding light when there is darkness, or it is simply a concept that can assist to move forward."



BEGIN AGAIN

The completion of *Begin Again* was a new activity added to WCD's 2021/2022 programming and presented live at The Festival des Arts de Saint-Sauveur (Quebec, July 2021), for WCD's Season Launch and within Culture Days (September 2021). Previously, the work was pivoted to video format during the COVID-19 lockdown. At that time, the stage version was left to be completed later when the project pivoted to a virtual delivery. We were so thrilled to complete this work and share it in person.

SUBSCRIPTION SERIES

WCD's main focus continued to be the three-show Subscription Series, which programmed a line-up of all-female choreographers.

BLACK BALLERINA

The first subscription show was Black Ballerina by Syreeta Hector (Toronto). Based on Hector's blackness and indigeneity in relationship to classical ballet, Black Ballerina explores the nuances within identity and the unconscious ways one tries to fit in. A thought provoking and relevant work, Black Ballerina is a powerful contemporary choreography created in response to Hector's relationship with race. WCD was thrilled to be the first to introduce Hector's work to audiences west of Toronto.

Black Ballerina came to Winnipeg with national and international acclaim. The 2019 performance of Black Ballerina was nominated for a Dora Mavor Moore Award and the work has received support and acclaim through multiple residencies and national and international presenters. Performed by Hector, Black Ballerina brought important subject matter and unbridled energy to the stage.

WCD + ICÔNE POP

The second subscription show was slated to be a new creation for WCD + *Icône Pop* by Mélanie Demers (Montreal). These shows were unfortunately cancelled due to concerns for the safety and wellbeing of our artists and our community.

WCD's strategy to have alternate and additional programming in place mitigated this unexpected situation, resulting in minimal impact to the budget.

IN BETWEEN HERE AND NOW

The third subscription show, in between here and now, was a new creation by WCD Artistic Director, Jolene Bailie. This work featured an ensemble of Winnipeg dancers, lighting by Hugh Conacher, set and projection design by Simon Hughes and original sound by Emma Hendrix.

Bailie has honed her artistic career creating abstract, deeply reflective and conceptually derived works. Her latest offering, 'exploring dynamics of perception and desire,' is no exception. ... the display of vulnerability proved to be one of the greatest strengths of in between here and now. Another strength was the choreography's array of dizzying rolls, athletic lifts, flips, mind-numbing inversions, deep crouches and crawls across the floor, hallmarks of Bailie's restless choreographic style."

ONLINE CONTENT

As we danced through the challenges of COVID-19, WCD continued to create and provide online content throughout the entire season.

The virtual version of *Begin Agαin* was selected to be presented online at The National Arts Centre's "Capsule" showcase, June 01- Aug 31, 2021.

The online Artist Talk with WCD Guest Artist in Residence, Ralph Escamillan, which was previously delayed due to COVID-19, was presented in February 2022 and continues to be available online and on demand.

In April 2022, a virtual version of $in\ between\ here\ and\ now\ was$ filmed for an online presentation.

In May 2021, WCD engaged in a professional editing process for *in between here and now* and presented this work online, June 10-July 03, 2022.

WCD: Class at Home and WCD: Class at Home 2 continue to be available free online and on-demand. These are advanced/professional level classes created for dancers to train at home during the COVID-19 pandemic.



WCD'S EMERGING ARTIST INITIATIVE

WCD is committed to providing meaningful projects for emerging dancers. For 2021/2022, WCD engaged in a four-week project for emerging dancers, culminating in a three-show run of *Reconnect*.

Reconnect featured three physically distanced works by WCD Artistic Director, Jolene Bailie, including the premiere of a brand-new work for three dancers, "Dancing Through Uncertainty." Reconnect also included the solo, "COVID Sonata" and the trio, "Aspects of Alterity."

WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative was in partnership with the School of Contemporary Dancers.

The first performance of Reconnect was presented as part of WCD's Culture Days' "Hub" activities, the second show was a special school matinee and the final show was a public ticketed performance.

WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative continued to be active in November, December, April and May as two of the dances were further presented by the School of Contemporary Dancers, for a total of eight additional performances.

In addition, the Emerging Artist Initiative was in rehearsal in May in preparation for touring to Regina, as presented by New Dance Horizons' Stream of Dance Festival.





PROFESSIONAL CLASSES

For the third season in row WCD offered a consistent schedule of professional level classes. These classes run in conjunction with the company's project work and are also open for drop-ins.

In 2021/2022, WCD programmed 88 professional-level classes over 11 months.

GUEST ARTISTS AND PROFESSIONAL WORKSHOPS

WCD was host to four guest artists and presented 12 hours of creative workshops for artists.

Incredibly valuable for the development of artists, workshops provide an opportunity to exchange ideas and share perspectives. Creative workshops also provide a nuanced opportunity for personal growth and connection, often serving as catalysts to further inspire artistic practice. Creative workshops also provide an opportunity for both WCD and individuals to connect with the national community.

For 2021/2022, workshops focused on sustaining longer improvisations and provided time, space and conversation for considering entry points into new creation, generating movement and creating choreography.

For 2021/2022, WCD presented in-person artist talks with guest artists Syreeta Hector (November 28) and Sara Porter (May 26) as well with WCD Artistic Director, Jolene Bailie, and all of the dancers performing for *in between here and now* (April 24). Artist talks were moderated by WCD's Programming Support, Ian Mozdzen.



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The video rendition of Jera Wolfe's Begin Again was screened in person at Tai Kwun Centre for Heritage and Arts' Off Stage, On Screen program (Hong Kong, August 2021).

New programming included: serving as a Culture Days "Hub," which included four, free/pay what you may activities, including the Season Launch, two nights of window projections, and a Culture Days performance of *Reconnect*.

WCD was thrilled to present a studio performance by Sara Porter on May 26, 2022.

WCD's Guest Artist in Residence project with Idan Cohen was finally completed, which was previously delayed due to COVID.

Partnerships for 2021/2022 include: Culture Days, Nuit Blanche, Théâtre Cercle Molière, Manitoba Centennial Corporation, Festival des Arts de Saint-Sauveur, the School of Contemporary Dancers and Cinematheque.


