OUR STORY

Winnipeg's Contemporary Dancers (WCD) is a not-for-profit organization & registered charity dedicated to the creation and presentation of contemporary dance.

Founded by Rachel Browne in 1964, the company was incorporated as a registered charity in 1970, and has presented a subscription series since 1971.

In 2022, WCD celebrated 58 years of creating innovative dance works. WCD has, through the tireless leadership of dedicated contemporary dance artists, fueled the art form's development and established a presence and influence on stages in Winnipeg and across the country.

WCD is a vital resource and presenter for the local and regional community, has had a significant impact on the development of contemporary dance in Canada and is Canada's longest-serving contemporary dance company.

Like other companies of its size, WCD moves through phases of development that include expansion and contraction associated with personnel changes, shifts in the cultural landscape and financing, among others.

MESSAGE FROM ARTISTIC DIRECTOR



The 22/23 season was my fourth season as Artistic Director and WCD's 58th season. Working in studio with the WCD artists, creating new work, teaching Company Class, and producing WCD's shows and events were central to my role as Artistic Director.

WCD's 58th season connected with internationally and nationally award-winning artists and programmed a broad range of artists - including: emerging, mid-career, senior, IBPOC and Winnipeg-based.

Season highlights included working with the spectacular WCD dancers, creating new work, introducing the work of Daina Ashbee to Winnipeg, welcoming Guest Artist, Idan Cohen, in residence at WCD for over 6 weeks, witnessing Christopher House perform NEWS and proudly witnessing every single performance!

Congratulations to all the artists who came together to work together for a fantastic season! Thank you!

22/23 saw an increase in engagements and work for local dancers and an increase in our total number of performances – including adding two student matinees, adding two more preview performances, and four community performances featuring ensembles of Winnipeg-based dancers.

Compared to the previous season, there was an increase in number of artists engaged, increase in ticket revenue, increase in donations received, and an increase in number of performances. WCD completed the second phase of a three-phase renovation - expanding the lobby and replacing the carpet. Expanding the lobby was an exciting and dramatic improvement for all users of our space!

WCD participated in learning activities through OF/FOR/BY ALL, an international organization to promote greater diversity in the arts; and staff, artists and board members participated in Conflict Resolution training.

The ripple effect of COVID-19 saw WCD in the unusual position of working with a larger than anticipated accumulated surplus. A surplus reduction plan was created and surplus was invested in artistic programming. This unique situation caused us to have an annual operating deficit, while still maintaining an accumulated surplus. This situation is expected to continue into the 23/24 season as we strive to maintain similar levels of programming despite inflation and other challenges of our ever-evolving world.

Sincere appreciation to the WCD staff, board, artists and arts professionals, whose work make WCD's programming and operations possible.

22/23 SEASON

WCD exists to create and present contemporary dance. For 22/23, WCD performed 23 in-person performances in a variety of settings. The focus continued to be WCD's three-show subscription series.

SUBSCRIPTION SERIES

22/23 was an exciting and highly commendable season. Despite Covid related challenges and concerns around the "return to normal," WCD was adaptable and delivered progressive and boundary-pushing contemporary dance.

WCD's 22/23 season resonated with courageous spirit and featured strong, distinct creators who created from a range of perspectives and through varied creative processes. Programming choices were made by way of fulfilling WCD's mandate, vision, and artistic goals; relevance to society, resource availability, local representation, and development of the form.

New this season, WCD programmed a Thursday preview performance to all subscription series shows and added two student matinees.

Since 2019, WCD has strived to ensure each subscription series includes four main components: the development of new work featuring local dancers, investing in new creation/commissions, bringing the work of Guest Artists to WCD, and presenting work created by the AD. We are thrilled that we were able to meet these goals for 22/23.

SERPENTINE

The first subscription series show was Serpentine created by internationally acclaimed Métis/Dutch creator, Diana Ashbee and performed by IBPOC dancer, Irene Martinez and set to original music by Jean-Francois Blouin.

Ashbee's work reframes indigeneity through an intimate experience and is highly relevant to our present day. Ashbee came to WCD with worldwide success and international acclaim. This was the debut performance of Ashbee's work in Winnipeg.

LOOKING GLASS

The second subscription series show was Looking $Gl\alpha ss$, a new work featuring six local dancers by Vancouver/Israeli-based creator, Idan Cohen.

Cohen connected to WCD by way of a public call to artists was selected as a Guest Artist in Residence by a diverse panel. Growing up in the socialist community of the Kibbutz and Cohen's lived experience as a queer male in the middle east informs his artistic life and work. This was the debut performance of Cohen's work in Winnipeg.

Looking Glass featured an ensemble of six Winnipeg dancers; piano Etudes by Philip Glass, played live by Lisa Rumpel; lighting by Hugh Conacher and costumes by Megan Latouche. Israeli-born Idan Cohen's Looking Glass resonates as a haunting ode to the elasticity of time... Cohen dares us to peer through our own looking glasses of perception, as we step gingerly into the future, and our bruised, albeit still hopeful world."

RETUNING

As AD, Bailie presents one full evening of choreography per season as part of WCD's subscription series. *retuning* featured an all-local team of dancers and collaborators – including six dancers, lighting by Hugh Conacher, costumes by Megan Latouche and original sound by Emma Hendrix.

Bailie wisely leaves room for personal interpretation with her dynamic, highly visceral choreography, with dancers flying through the air, leaping onto each other's backs, being held aloft as though in sacrificial rite...

ANCILLARY PROGRAMMING

While the focus of the season is WCD's Subscription Series, WCD also engaged in ancillary programming.

ADDITIONAL PERFORMANCES

In September 2022, WCD hosted an in-person Season Launch featuring performances by 7 WCD dancers in two works. This free/pay what you may event, offered the first opportunity to hear about our season line-up, enjoy a WCD performance – including the chance to celebrate both returning and new dancers, and connect with community.

In October 2022, WCD performed three different performances at three different locations for "Downtown Culture Days" and "Culture Days at the Forks" featuring 12 local dancers. Six WCD dancers performed an excerpt from Jolene Bailie's work in between here and now at The Forks, and 11 emerging dancers performed outdoor renditions of Bailie's *Proximity* at Stephen Juba Park and Old Market Square.

These free performances were supported through the Downtown Recovery Fund, a fund that supported programming downtown with a goal to encourage people to return to popular sites as we moved towards the endemic phase of the Covid-19 pandemic.

In November 2022, WCD performed to a full house at Nafro Dance Production's Moving Inspirations Dance Festival Gala, featuring performances by 5 local dancers.

In March 2023, WCD presented celebrated senior artist, Christopher House, performing the seminal work *NEWS* by Deborah Hay. This was the debut performance of Deborah Hay's work in Winnipeg.

Once again WCD presented a window projection, viewed from outdoors, for Culture Days/Nuit Blanche.

WCD'S EMERGING ARTIST INITIATIVE

WCD is committed to providing meaningful projects for emerging dancers.

For 22/23, WCD engaged in a multi-week project for emerging dancers in September and October – including training, new creation, coaching and two ticketed performances. WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative provided opportunities for twelve emerging dancers, the largest cast to date for this project.

Culminating in a two-show run of Flight Paths, featuring three works by WCD Artistic, Jolene Bailie. Programming included the premiere of a new work for eleven dancers, Proximity, a duet, The Space In Between and a trio, Lost.

WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative continued to be active in November and December as one of the dances was performed at the School of Contemporary Dancers annual winter concert for 4 additional performances.

In addition, one work from the Emerging Artist Initiative toured to Regina for two performances, presented by New Dance Horizons' *Stream of Dance Festival*, June 8-10, 2022.

in between here and now, a new creation by WCD Artistic Director, Jolene Bailie, was presented online June 10-July 03, 2022. This work featured an all-Winnipeg team, including an ensemble of Winnipeg dancers, lighting by Hugh Conacher, set + projection design by Simon Hughes and original sound by Emma Hendrix. Bailie has honed her artistic career creating abstract, deeply reflective and conceptually derived works. Her latest offering, "exploring dynamics of perception and desire", is no exception. ...the display of vulnerability proved to be one of the greatest strengths of in between here and now. Another strength was the choreography's array of dizzying rolls, athletic lifts, flips, mindnumbing inversions, deep crouches and crawls across the floor, hallmarks of Bailie's restless choreographic style."

THE RACHEL BROWNE THEATRE

WCD's facility is home for rehearsals, performances & administration, in addition, WCD operates and maintains the Rachel Browne Theatre.



FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS

In 2019, WCD made a commitment to engage in facility repairs, upgrades, and maintenance, as well as remain at our current residence - including operating the Rachel Browne Theatre. This commitment led to the envisioning of a three-phase renovation.

In 22/23 WCD completed the second phase of the three-phase plan. This included expanding the lobby, installing new carpet and a new admin office layout (to accommodate for the lobby expansion).

Expanding the lobby at WCD has transformed the experience for all users of our space. The space is more welcoming; people have more space to connect before and after performances; there is space for a concession/bar area – which we offered at all 22/23 performances; it has improved everyday work flow; and brought more sunlight with an additional window being allocated to the lobby area – a window which is also visible from inside the dance studio! The new carpet throughout brings the multi-year vision together and supports our venue in looking professional, clean, and welcoming.

Other facility improvements include: repositioning the upstage traveller further back (this is the curtain located at the far back of the stage) - allowing for a larger performance space on stage when the curtain is closed; adding some upstage lighting to support a larger playing area; plus research and planning for phase-three of the renovation plan.






