INTRODUCTION

24/25 was WCD's 60th Anniversary Season. WCD marked this incredible milestone with a celebratory season, showcasing the past, present and future of contemporary dance.

WCD's main focus continued to be the three show Subscription Series, delivering a combination of historical, relevant and brandnew work.

WCD presented work by six choreographers and featured 32 dancers and collaborators. The subscription series presented a broad range of artists: emerging, mid-career, senior, Winnipegbased and nationally/internationally acclaimed, with 40% of all dancers being IBPOC.

Programming choices were made by way of fulfilling WCD's mandate, vision, and artistic goals; relevance to society, resource availability, local representation, and development of the form.

Operations continued as expected and WCD is in good standing with all funders.

Serving as WCD's Artistic Director for the 60th Anniversary Season was a tremendous honour. With 60 years of history, there was a lot to celebrate, reflect on and consider.

Working in studio with the artists, creating and rehearsing works, teaching company classes, and producing WCD's shows and events were key to my role as Artistic Director. Staging and directing WCD's 60th Anniversary Tribute to Founder, Rachel Browne, was a significant artistic undertaking, both for myself and for WCD.

WCD's 24/25 season was my sixth season as Artistic Director, and we were thrilled to see increased audiences, and the most sold-out events and standing ovations ever during my tenure - with six sold-out events!

Additional highlights included: working with all the spectacular artists who participated in the season; welcoming returning artists and meeting new artists; creating the new duet, the realm of becoming; research and further development of my 2023 choreography, retuning; welcoming Guest Artist, Margie Gillis, in residence at WCD for 2 weeks; introducing the works of Lina Cruz, Sarah Hutton and Aiden Cass to Winnipeg audiences, and cheering on every single performance! Congratulations to all the artists who joined us in creating a fabulous anniversary season! Thank you!

24/25 also saw exciting work in other areas—a tremendous amount of work was completed with WCD's archives, meaningful community partnerships, professional development opportunities, increased donations and the launch of The Rachel Browne Legacy Campaign.

WCD continues to have no accumulated deficit and posted a surplus for YE2025. However, the organization weathered an unexpected and very severe cash flow crisis at the start of the season. This situation required a last-minute shift in programming and reductions in budget to all shows. Despite this, WCD delivered a fabulous season!

It has been my pleasure to lead this organization; heartfelt thanks to the WCD staff—to Iryna Kravchenko and Zambia Pankratz, and to the board, artists and arts professionals, whose work make WCD's programming and operations possible.

24/25 SEASON WCD'S 60THANNIVERSARY SEASON

WCD's 60th Anniversary Season was a milestone season for WCD! 24/25 saw increased audiences, increased donations, and an increase in the number of works presented.

WCD exists to create and present contemporary dance. For 24/25, WCD performed 13 in-person performances, with the three-show subscription series continuing to be the main investment of the season. Presenting a subscription series since 1971, WCD's subscription series is the only subscription series for contemporary dance in Manitoba.

In addition to presenting high quality work, individual artist development continued to be an important element of programming. 24/25 provided significant opportunities for local artists, engaged internationally and nationally awardwinning artists, and programmed a broad range of artists.

WCD's 60th Anniversary Tribute to Rachel Browne, WCD's Season Launch, WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative shows, as well as our partnerships with Flash Photo Fest and New Dance Horizons, all featured ensembles of local dancers. WCD's presentation of Old, featured a major collaboration with a local Visual Artist. WCD's strong investment in local artists created opportunities for both new and returning dancers.



SUBSCRIPTION SERIES



24/25 delivered an exciting and audience pleasing season of contemporary dance.

WCD'S 60TH ANNIVERSARY TRIBUTE TO RACHEL BROWNE

WCD opened its 60th Anniversary Subscription Series with a tribute concert to WCD's Founder, Rachel Browne. Showcasing five works performed by the dancers of today, this project celebrated our tremendous history through performances of present-day artists.

Some of Rachel's most cherished and memorable works were presented, including Sending Love, KJ4, My Romance, and Mouvement. Also on the program was the rarely seen (and very fun) solo Fine, Thank You!

WCD's Tribute to Rachel Browne featured an all-Winnipeg team and showcased seven spectacular dancers, who all interpreted and perform Rachel's works with power, nuance, sophistication and conviction.

Due to an anticipated demand for tickets, WCD offered one additional show, with the final show playing to a sold-out audience.


WCD's Tribute to Rachel Browne was staged and directed by WCD's Artistic Director, Jolene Bailie, with Rehearsal Direction for Mouvement and KJ4 by Kristin Haight, who danced in many of Browne's works, over many years.

As time passes and new dancers continually emerge into our profession, projects like this offer the unique opportunity for dancers of today to experience historical works. All the dancers who performed in the tribute concert entered the profession after Rachel's passing, offering a brand-new opportunity for the cast, who had never had the chance to work with Rachel when she was alive.

We are forever grateful for Rachel Browne. Her influence and legacy are why WCD exists today.

WCD's second subscription series show welcomed back Canadian Icon, Margie Gillis, with her new full-length solo show, *Old*, created in collaboration with Winnipeg-based Visual Artist Randal Newman.

Internationally acclaimed artist, Margie Gillis, is one of the most influential Canadian choreographer/dancers of the 20th and 21st centuries. Her performance career spans over 50 years.

Old was a show about time, ageing and change, which felt very fitting for WCD's 60th Anniversary. There was incredible interest from our community to experience the artistry of Margie Gillis! This show was very well received, and all performances sold out in advance.

As WCD's legacy and gets longer and more complex, one can't help but consider individual artists, age and impact. Celebrating the life of a performance career, such as Margie's incredible 50+ years of performance was relevant and inspiring.

ABOUT OLD:

Aging is an uneven process of fall and recovery, of loss and discovery. As the material world dissolves, the energy in all things becomes vivid and clear. How do we traverse this new landscape with joy, and honesty? How can curiosity and active yielding, help us embrace mystery? How do we hold the mantel of aging and patience, through physical loss?

TOMATO BLUES / BY MEANS OF EACH OTHER

For WCD's 60th Anniversary, WCD offered a public call to artists. The call was created to open the stage to works that were thinking about the future, to creators who were creating about the future, and those who were inspired by our future.

WCD boldly offered a submissionbased mainstage opportunity, resulting in a panel of contemporary dance professionals choosing two incredible works, Tomato Blues / by means of each other.

Since WCD's 60th anniversary season started off by honouring founder Rachel Browne, to next honoring the life of an iconic performer, it's felt very fitting that the theme "considering the future" was chosen to close the season.

ABOUT TOMATO BLUES, CREATED AND PERFORMED BY LINA CRUZ (MONTREAL):

Indirectly and symbolically, the work addresses the political dynamics with which our societies operate, hinting at the cruelty and paradox of our behaviours. The discourse makes a playful allusion to the patterns that have followed us all along our human evolution, portraying how easily we can shift from one side to the other, depending on how much power we have. As such, this piece opens a window to questioning where we stand today and what we want for our future.

ABOUT BY MEANS OF EACH OTHER, CREATED AND PERFORMED BY SARAH HUTTON AND AIDEN CASS (VANCOUVER):

by means of each other was created out of a deep bond between two people who are constantly fighting the temptation to be pulled into technology and out of human connection.

The work investigated the nuances of communication, power dynamics, coexisting, humour and wit.

The two embraced their trust, love, conflicts and willingness to transform, to illuminate the ridiculous, tangled, and resilient pursuit of partnership.

ANCILLARY PROGRAMMING



While the focus of the season continues to be WCD's Subscription Series, WCD also invests in additional programming, with all additional programming created specifically for the Winnipeg community. This programming included a season launch, professional classes, WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative, Artist Talks, additional performances and a major archive project.

SEASON LAUNCH

The season opened in September with a sold-out Season Launch event. This event featured a performance of Last Schema—created by WCD's Artistic Director, featuring six local dancers; and the screening of A Good Madness, celebrating WCD founder, Rachel Browne, by Winnipeg-based filmmaker, Danielle Sturk.

PROFESSIONAL CLASSES

WCD is committed to providing training for professional dancers. For the sixth season in a row WCD offered a strong offering of professional level classes, with most classes open for drop-ins.

In 24/25, WCD programmed 51 in-person, professional-level classes plus three creative workshops with visiting Guest Artists.

WCD'S EMERGING ARTIST INITIATIVE

For decades, WCD created and provided incredible opportunities for emerging dancers. For 24/25, WCD engaged in a 6-week project for emerging dancers in September and October - including training, new creation, coaching and two ticketed performances, culminating with the show, Game On, featuring four works and eight dancers. Game On also played to a sold-out audience.

WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative also provided an opportunity for one WCD dancer to be engaged as an additional rehearsal director.

Programming included four works by WCD Artistic Director, Jolene Bailie, including: one brand new work—the realm of becoming, a re-envisioning of the highly technical and athletic quartet, Calibrations of Flux, a reimagining of Bailie's 2025 group work signals to segue, and the crowd-pleasing trio, Game On.

WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative continued to be active for two and a half weeks in December as Calibrations of Flux was performed at the School of Contemporary Dancers annual winter concert for 4 additional performances.

WCD's Emerging Artist Initiative was in partnership with the School of Contemporary Dancers and made possible with the generous support of The Gail Asper Family Foundation.

ARTIST TALKS

For 24/25, WCD presented three Artist Talks.
Moderators included former WCD Artistic Director,
Tom Stroud; Former WCD dancer, choreographer,
and filmmaker Danille Sturk; and local Dancer/
Creator/Intermedia Artist, Freya Olafson.

Special thanks to all the artists who joined us in our conversations on stage. It was engaging and thought provoking to dialogue about processes, viewpoints, performance and more! ARCHIVE PROJECT

24/25 saw a tremendous amount of work completed with WCD's Archives. Supported by a Centennial Grant from The Winnipeg Foundation, this work saw the preservation and digitization of many years of archival history. This project completed 30+ years of updates, the maintenance and digitization of a portion of WCD's print archives, as well as a thorough review and update of the archives that were already housed at Manitoba Archives.

25/26 will see the completion of this project, culminating with the updated archives publicly available through Manitoba Archives. Upon completion, anyone who may wish to research and view WCD's print archives can do so through Manitoba Archives.

This project has been a tremendous and commendable accomplishment! Special thanks to WCD Artistic Director Jolene Bailie, for taking the initiative to envision this project, and to Bev Pike who served as WCD's lead archivist. Thank you to archivist, Jordan Kaczor and WCD staff, Iryna Kravchenko and Zambia Pankratz, for their work on this!




